American Heritage ${ }^{\circledR}$ Dictionary of the English Language defines Identity transformation
the "function whose output is identical to its input." It is a data transformation that copies the source data into the destination data without change. It is considered an essential process in creating a reusable transformation library.

In mathematics, "if corresponding values of two expressions, that contain same variables, are same for all allowable values of variables, then expressions are called identically equal. The identity is the equality that is correct for all allowable values of variables that it contains. The replacement of one expression by another, that is identically equal to it, is called identically transformation of expression.

Geometric transformations serve several useful roles in the study of geometries.
"1. Groups of transformations can be used to classify geometries. 2. Properties of configurations that remain unchanged after applying a transformation (invariants of the transformation) are generally the significant properties that one wants to study. 3. Transformations provide the formal groundwork underlying Euclid's loose concept of superimposition. 4. Transformations allow motion to enter into the discussion of an otherwise static subject. 5. Transformations provide the link between Geometry and Abstract Algebra."

It is very convincing to become a Jew. They say conversion requires identity transformation. Gary Tobin in an article says that "an individual does not convert from one state to another; identity transforms through both experience and understanding. The transformed identity leads to inclusion, a sense of belonging". He continues to say that the Moabite woman "Ruth did not convert; she became a Jew. The concept of becoming is vital, especially since the process begins prior to formal declarations and continues afterward." It is a process to become a Jew which involves range of activities leading to identity transformation. It is adoption of one identity and abandonment of another. It means thinking and feeling like a Jew and feeling bound to the community of Jews, for better or worse.

We are curious to find our identity. At the heart of everything we do in life is Identity. Consulting services are designed to transform your business and personal strategy into clear action. One of the former president of the United States once said that he was trying to find his identity when he was a young adult. Motivation and starting point of transformation may differ. We identify who we are by our family name. We identify who we are through our profession. We identify who we are based on our financial status. The list goes on. However, by drawing from these sources of well, we
come up with an incorrect feeling of safety or assurance. Our safety and assurance should be based on our true identity in Jesus Christ alone! One of the best examples of identity transformation found in the Scriptures is of Peter himself. My sincere hope is that this article will encourage your heart with the basis, opportunity and responsibility of a life transformed by Jesus Christ!

One of the most famous personalities of the Bible is Simon Bar-Jona, commonly known as Peter, the Apostle. A very excited character, a rough and harsh fisherman, he was always packed with energy and action. He definitely had his natural strengths. He was outgoing, sociable, visible and excited. He was very impulsive and strong-willed. His faults were also quite obvious. There is a big difference after he was transformed. Most important of all, he loved Christ.

In the life of Apostle Peter, we find one of the strongest pictures of identity transformation. Peter found his sense of security in his own capability and self-reliance, before meeting Jesus Christ. His very identity was that he was an expert fisherman of the Sea of Galilee and his occupation and courage were the sources of his confidence. These two areas of Peter's life needed sanctification and Jesus made sure of that.

The first instance where Jesus humbled Peter is seen in Luke chapter 5. People were crowded around the lake of Gennesaret and listening to the Word of God. The fishermen were washing their nets. Jesus got into one of the boats that belonged to Simon and asked him to move the boat a little from the shore. Jesus taught the people from that boat. When He was done speaking, He said to Simon to launch "out into the deep water and let down the nets for a catch". Simon who was an expert fisherman, replied "Master, we've worked hard all night and haven't caught anything. But because you say so, I will let down the nets." Simon might have been an expert fisherman. But his expertise was solely based on his confidence and courage. Jesus proved that He is Lord and shattered Simon's boast of an expert fisherman. Was the action of Jesus horrible? Was it hateful? I do not believe so. Jesus was preparing Simon as He prepares you and me to do great and mighty things for Him. First, He had to make Simon understand about the source of his false security. Peter was humbled before his fellow fisherman. He was humbled at the very same place where Peter boasted in his occupation and courage in order that he would find his security as a child of the King. As time went on, Peter began to trust in the all sufficiency of Christ instead of his own.

Right after feeding the five thousand, Jesus had something to teach the disciples. He sent the multitude away and then sent the disciples across the Sea of Galilee, which is a big lake. The story is told
in the book of Matthew chapter 14. When the disciples saw Jesus walking on the water, they cried out in fear. They thought a ghost is coming towards them. However, Jesus asked them to take courage that it was He and there is no need for them to be afraid. The thoughtless Peter replied, "Lord, if it is you, tell me to come to you on the water." Peter wanted to believe that Jesus was the Son of God. However, he was looking for proof. Jesus did not get angry at Peter for asking this. Jesus simply invited him to "Come." When Jesus called Peter on to the water, Peter had enough faith to step out of the boat, in the dark, as the wind was pounding up the waves, because Peter knew and believed if the Lord had called him, that is all he needed and His will would be done. This proved that Peter's faith and confidence in Jesus had grown. At first, Peter's eyes were focused on Jesus. Peter did not have to worry about the wind or waves because he had faith that Jesus would not let him sink. While Peter was focused on Jesus, his faith was strong. He could see the power that Jesus held over all things. He knew how much Jesus loved him, and that Jesus would never let him down. However, when he lost his focus on Christ, Peter began to sink. We can do whatever the Lord calls us to do and we dare not do anything the Lord has not authorized us. Your faith will be strong when you keep your eyes on Jesus. Jesus has power over all things. Is there anything that He cannot do? When you keep your focus on His power and His love for you, your faith will be strong.

The All Knowing Lord knew that Peter's courage would fail him again. When Peter said "Even if all fall away on account of you, I never will" (Matthew 26:33), Jesus told Peter "This very night, before the rooster crows, you will disown me three times." (26:34) However, even after the betrayal, Jesus reinstated Peter. Imagine where this happened! Peter once found his identity at the Sea of Galilee. Sitting at the very Sea of Galilee, Jesus asked Peter "Do you love me?" Before the transformation Peter would have said "Yes Lord, I love you. I will die for you!" However, Peter is now a different, transformed person and he replied "Lord, you know all things; you know that I love you." (John 21:17).

Jesus will shred us of our earthly identity so that He can exchange it with something greater. We may have our own transformation account. Towards the end, Peter exchanged independence for dependence, false sense of security and courage for trust, and self-confidence for reliance on Christ. The result of a transformed Peter who addressed the multitude was the conversion of 3000 people on the day of Pentecost. Jesus has a different vision of maturity from others. It is the ability and willingness to be led where you would rather not go. Think of the last time God was calling

you to make a change in your life. Was it difficult to let go of your own wishes and follow God's direction?" In the words of Apostle Paul, "And we all, who with unveiled faces contemplate the Lord's glory, are being transformed into his image with ever increasing glory which comes from the Lord, who is the spirit." (2 Corinthians 3:18)

Peter was really an irreplaceable man. He was the boldest of all disciples. He said things that other people only thought. He was the type of person who did things that other people did not have the courage to do. Peter was completely drawn to Jesus. Peter wanted to follow Jesus with his whole heart. However, many times he made mistakes. What was it that transformed an ambiguous fisherman into chief of apostles of the Christian church, which is possibly the most world-changing undertaking ever? It was the revelation of faith. Brief references to the disciple and apostle Simon Peter provide special perception into the ministry and person of Jesus Christ. It draws our attention to what was happening at that moment in training Peter was receiving from the Master, which moved him from simple beginnings to the world-changer he became. Each reference in the Scripture is loaded with meaning. This was the man who would be developed and mentored by Jesus. Scripture pulls out what Jesus was doing with him for the job that was ahead. There is no reference to him that was accidental and without purpose. Scripture deals with them all in order. The journey for Simon Peter deals with the dynamic issue of faith. That is where we see the transformation in him which made him so effective as a leader, miracle worker, teacher and evangelist. There was nothing special in him. That is the truth. With all of us also, it is the same way: there is nothing special in us. Like Peter, we need to be on that journey of faith discovery and apply what he was taught by the Master, for us also to be people of amazing faith.

God changed Peter from a common fisherman to an anointed miracle worker. Peter was a great Christian but for all his greatness, his faith journey was interrupted with incidents of doubt and struggle. God stayed with Peter, step-by-step, and transformed him from a new convert to a mature believer. Simon's character before conversion was less stable than his transformed nature. But, regardless of Simon's recklessness and contradictions, Jesus designated him for what, by God's grace, he would become. So was it with Paul. It was the grace of God and His will that Saul

the Pharisee, who became Paul the apostle, a Roman citizen would ultimately witness for Christ in Rome. However, the transformation was quite a process.

Prior to the description of the parable of the unmerciful servant in Matthew chapter 18, the writer records an occasion of Peter coming to Jesus with a question: "Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother or sister who sins against me? Peter might have thought that he was a generous person and offered his own number, "Up to seven times?" Jesus' answer showed that Peter's thinking is not in line with His and Jesus corrected Peter's thinking by answering "I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times" (or seventy times seven). We should not keep score of the times we forgive others. If we are keeping the score, then it is not true forgiveness.

We must forgive others the way God forgave us. If we fail, then we are proclaiming to the world that we disagree with the way in which He forgives. The world hears that message, and so does God. So don't let the issue of forgiveness, hinder your prayer life. Forgive as Christ has forgiven you. In Apostle Paul's words, "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you" (Ephesians 4:32).

The name Peter (Greek: Petros) means "rock" or "rock-man". However, Peter was anything but a rock. He was not dependable the way a Christian leader should be. In Capernaum Peter invited Jesus and the disciples to his house even though his wife's mother was sick in bed (Mark 1:29-30). He tried to kill the servant of the high priest (John 18:10). When Christ appeared to Peter and some of the other disciples when they were fishing on the Sea of Tiberius, Peter "wrapped his outer garment around him (for he had taken it off), and jumped into the water" (John 21:7). Without the Spirit of God, he often spoke or acted in a way that would be unsuitable for a Christian. His actions opposed a fundamental insecurity in spite of his outward confidence. Peter is known for being bold, spontaneous and impulsive, but without knowing more about his background, it is impossible to know what caused him to be that way.

All four Gospels reveal Peter's shameful denial of Jesus. It shows Peter's fear, weakness and lack of commitment at times. "He began to call down curses, and he swore" perhaps reverting into habits from his earlier life (Matthew 26:73-74). Peter went
through the most possible humiliating experience. He well understood the significance of having forsaken and even denied Jesus Christ. He had "wept bitterly" (Luke 22:62). All of us have let Christ down many times, although in less theatrical ways. With all of Peter's strengths and abilities, it seems a little strange that he would have some fundamental insecurity. But personalities are largely formed by experiences in childhood, and we do not know what Peter's childhood was like.

The process of transformation is not completed at baptism. There is further growth. Evidence of Peter's further growth long after he received the Holy Spirit is evident. There was a time how Peter declined back from eating with gentiles when men from the Jerusalem church were presentand this was many years after his conversion (Galatians 2:11-13). However, Peter took Paul's correction well and changed. We must be ready to stand unwavering in our faith and live uncompromising lives in the face of opposition. It is His strength that makes us able to stand. He enables us to be obedient to His call, when we surrender to Him. Obedience and submission are a powerful declaration of the Gospel.

Opposition was a constant companion in Apostle Paul's life. He had to fight the opposition on a regular basis. However, he achieved victory in the trials. How was he able to do it? Paul made a decision and he was determined that whatever the enemy did will not keep him from doing the will of God. He knew whom he has believed. His trust was on the firm foundation of Jesus Christ. He cleaved to his Lord and Savior and His promises. His presence and the promise of eternal life gave him the strength and it drew him closer to God regardless of the imprisonment, ridicule, torture, beatings, and mockery. The Apostle Paul suffered all this and it enabled him to see the Word of God piercing and refreshing the Gentiles and the Jews to God's saving grace. We may face trials and spiritual battles, but if we put our strength and determination on the sure foundation of Jesus Christ, we will never fail. Words of Apostle Peter is very fitting "And the God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast" (1 Peter 5:10).

The first recorded sermon of Peter is found in Acts chapter 1. In verses 15-22, we can detect an added element of soberness, maturity, wisdom and knowledge of Scripture. This was clearly motivated by the Holy Spirit. In his second sermon recorded in chapter two, we meet a gigantic preacher of the gospel giving a determined and powerful message. Chapter three tells us that "One day Peter and John were going up to the temple at the time of prayer". A change that taken place. Peter and John together going up to the temple where the people were. A willingness to the obedience of Jesus' instruction to do so. When they were arrested, they were so motivated and fearless in their
testimony because they were "filled with the Holy Spirit" (4:8). The rulers, elders and the teachers of the law "saw the courage of Peter and John and realized that they were unschooled, ordinary men, they were astonished" (4:13).

Peter was no longer a selfcentered and vain man after Pentecost. He was not seeking self- glory, but in everything he did, sought the glory of God. Listen to the words of Peter when the crowd gathered in astonishment when the lame man at the temple was healed: "Fellow Israelites, why does this surprise you? Why do you stare at us as if by our own power or godliness we had made this man walk?" (3:12). He declared unto them that it was the power and name of Jesus Christ (3:1316).

Peter became a humble servant of Jesus Christ; he became a bondservant and "an apostle of Jesus Christ". The two epistles that we have in the bible written by Apostle Peter shows the humility and lovingkindness. His spiritual humility is specified by dependence on prayer. The dedication to prayer by Peter can be seen in Acts chapter three, four six and ten. In his first epistle he wrote "In the same way, you who are younger, submit yourselves to your elders. All of you, clothe yourselves with humility toward one another, because God opposes the proud but shows favor to the humble" (1 Peter 5:5-6). Who would have imagined that Simon - the independent, self and strong-willed, arrogant, rash and boastful Simon - would become a humble servant-leader, who possessed a shepherd's heart? In his epistles, he gives us beautiful instruction on how to live the Spirit-filled life.

Peter and John handled a flood of persecution from the same religious leaders who had crucified their Savior. But there was no more fear, no more weakness and no more denial! Acts chapter four (4:13) speaks about the unwavering courage and authority of the Spirit when he stood before the council to testify. The rulers saw a different person and were marveled. Why were the rulers marveled? They saw that the same power of Jesus, when He walked on the earth, was in them. What motivated them? What empowered them? It is nothing but the "Iiving hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" (1 Peter 1:3). A transformed Peter says that we must be thankful even for our trials, "though refined by fire" and that we must be "filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy" because of our living hope. (1 Peter 1:6-11).

Apostle Paul experienced an intense transformation in his life. Everything he believed and stood for was crushed in an instant. When he met God on the way to Damascus, all the devout religious duties he carried out were reduced to worthless. A zealous Pharisee who breathed out murderous threats, who watched the coats and oversaw the murder of Stephen, to a "chosen instrument to proclaim" His "name to the Gentiles and their kings and to the people of Israel" and to "suffer for" His "name." (Acts 9:15-16) Imagine what His amazing grace can accomplish in your
life today if you surrender to the transforming work of the Holy Spirit!

An aged and matured Peter exhorts us to "rid yourselves of all malice, all deceit, hypocrisy, envy, and slander of every kind. Like newborn babies, crave the pure spiritual milk, so that by it you have tasted that the Lord is good" (1 Peter 2:1-2). He also speaks of submission to authority. "Submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every human authority: whether to the emperor, as the supreme authority, or to governors, who are sent by him to punish those who do wrong and to commend those who do right" (1 Peter 2: 13-14). Peter reminds us of the example of Jesus Christ who submitted to the authorities and did not retaliate or insult "instead he entrusted himself to him who judges justly" (1 Peter 2:21-25). This is something to be considered! He also speaks about suffering for doing Good. "All of you, be like-minded, be sympathetic, love one another, be compassionate and humble. Do not repay evil with evil or insult with insult. On the contrary, repay evil with blessing, because to this you were called so that you may inherit a blessing" (1 Peter 3: 8-9). We, including me, must pay close attention to the words of this aged and matured Apostle who came a long way. We must ask ourselves: where are we with regard to the exhortations of Apostle Peter?

Who would have expected Simon to become a primary example of rock-solid transformation, truly living up to his new name Peter? And who would have anticipated Simon to become one of the world's greatest teachers of love, hope, humility and respect for and submission to authority? Spiritual transformation requires the greatest miracle of all, but God's Word is encouraging. If people like Peter and Paul could become genuinely transformed, then we know there is hope for all the rest of us.

Imagine the miracle of transformation! The miracle of change! The miracle of the gospel! The transforming power of the gospel of Jesus Christ! As Apostle Paul said "For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes" (Romans 1:16).

God transformed Peter from a possible coward to a faithful martyr. From the Galilean nobody to the pillar of the church. From a disciple of John the Baptist to follower of Jesus Christ. From Simon, the son of Bar-Jonah to Peter, the Rock. From wealthy child of Bar-Jonah to destitute follower of Christ. From Simon, the fisherman to Peter, the fisher of Men. From cowardly boaster to dependable disciple. From Quick-Lipped and impulsive disciple to obedient and faithful Apostle. From uneducated disciple to defender of the faith.

God transformed Peter and he can do the same for you. "But by the grace of God I am what I am". Be good shepherds "as God wants you to be". Be an example to others. "When the Chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory that will never fade away" (1 Peter 5:4)

US senators confirmed Brett M．Kavanaugh to a lifetime appoint－ ment to the United States Supreme Court by a vote of 50－48．

Kavanaugh is the second Supreme Court justice appointed by Presi－ dent Trump．The vote at the end of a relatively untroubled Saturday of mild protests and senatorial speeches marked an anticlimax．For a political drama riveted the nation for weeks，may have few surprises yet to come the Democratic impeechement．Kavanaugh will take over Justice Anthony Kennedy＇s swing seat as soon as Tuesday morning． Observers will be watching to see if the court＇s five－justice majority sets out on a radical project to refashion American law in accordance with the conservative movement＇s desires，or whether one of those five justices takes on the role of checking those ambitions and steer－ ing the Court on a more moderate path．Unlike Justice Kennedy， Kavanaugh has a reputation as a hardline conservative partisan．Many of the Senators voting against Kavanaugh＇s confirmation cited the partisan sentiments expressed in his opening statement at last Thursday＇s hearing to consider Christine Blasey Ford＇s allegations that Kavanaugh sexually assaulted her at a high school party in early 1980s． In that prepared statement，Kavanaugh blamed Democrats for allow－ ing Ford＇s allegations to come to light and appeared to promise re－ venge against them if he were confirmed to the bench．

Early in his career，Kavanaugh served in roles more partisan than a typical nominee to the court．In addition to more traditional clerkships and a stint at the Solicitor General＇s Office，Kavanaugh worked as a prosecutor in Kenneth Starr＇s investigation of President Bill Clinton， making a reputation for himself as one of the most aggressive pros－ ecutors in a famously unsparing operation pursuing the Monica Lewinsky scandal．He also got involved in the recount fight on George W．Bush’s side in the disputed 2000 presidential election．Kavanaugh went on to serve in the Bush White House，first in the counsel＇s office and then as staff secretary，managing judicial nominations and other hot－button issues in the fraught years after the 9／11 terrorist attacks． This work remained shrouded in some mystery even on the day of his confirmation vote．

## HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE IS A SIIENT KILIER AND HOW CAN TACKIE IT

Over A billion people worldwide suffer from hy－ pertension．It＇s predicted to increase by 60 per cent to 1.56 billion in 2025．It＇s also a leading risk factor for cardiovascular diseases，diabetes，foetal and ma－ ternal death in pregnancy，dementia and renal fail－ ure．Two－thirds of those with hypertension live in economically developing countries like India，where
 it＇s responsible for 57 per cent of all stroke deaths and 24 per cent of coronary heart disease deaths．

## WHAT IS HYPERTENSION？

Hypertension is a condition in which the blood vessels have persistently raised pressure，putting them under increased stress．The higher the pressure，the harder the heart has to pump，which is why it leads to cardio problems．＂

## SYMPTOMS

Headache，nosebleeds，irregular heartbeats，buzzing in the ears，tiredness，dizziness， weakness，nausea，confusion，anxiety，chest pain and breathlessness are some of the common symptoms of hypertension．
Recognised as one of the major risk factors for cardiovascular disease，hypertension is also called as the＇Silent Killer＇as it often does not exhibit any symptoms during its early stages．

## TREATMENT

Hypertension can only be managed with medication and lifestyle changes．
Avoid having excess salt as it puts strain on arteries which carry blood，which makes the tiny muscles in the artery walls stronger and thicker．

# Grief Therapy is not Brief Therapy 

I credit family counselor Gary Smalley with that rhyme，＂grief therapy＂ never is＂brief therapy＂．Deeper wounds take more time to heal．Burn patients have to endure multiple sessions of stripping away of old dying tissue followed by repeated skin grafts．Sometimes the same painful reopening of sores occurs in healing wounded hearts．Jesus came to＂heal the brokenhearted＂（Luke 4：18）．Grief is the chief wound．I can sympathize with those who have been through it．One of the New Testament words translated as＂heal＂is the Greek word therapeou．Therapy can mean having a talk or taking a walk．Hugs，not drugs，is the better prescription． The grieving one may need lots of company or they may need left alone． There are as many therapies as there are people，but the key is in understanding that the pain doesn＇t normally go away by eight o＇clock Monday morning．

I find our text verse very helpful．＂Until＂is one of the great transitional prepositions in the Bible．The shepherd searches after＂that which is lost，until he finds it＂（Luke 15：4）．Then＂when＂he has found it，he lays


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and works all things together for our good．The shadow is what is forced to flee away not the heart or the will．Grief recovery is not a shutting down of the emotions．It is＂recovery＂，that is，gaining back the inner You that has been on leave for so long．

Grief therapy that becomes belief therapy ends in relief therapy． Sometimes just a sigh，just a＂whew＂，is enough to relax stressed－out nerves．Other times the soul needs thorough catharsis and that is the work of the Holy Spirit．He is the Master Therapist．Sometimes He stirs within us＂groanings which cannot be uttered＂（Romans 8：26）．The pangs have no expression in words and at times they may become violent，but the Spirit understands all broken syllables．And each pang helps to get something＂out＂that has been trapped within．He knows when enough has been enough then lets the one He has cradled go free with a pat and a kiss．A scar usually remains but it becomes a badge of honor that declares to all，＂I have suffered well＂． it on his shoulders rejoicing（vs 5）．＂Until＂eventually leads to＂when＂．
＂Until＂can mean five minutes or five months．Patience 101 is never passed in a single semester．The Shulamite girl committed to persevere＂until the day break＂．Experience assures that day will break．I said，day will break．His mercies＂are new every morning： great is thy faithfulness＂（Lamentations 3：23）．Weeping endures for a night（and sometimes for years），but joy comes in the morning．And when day does break the verse says the shadows will＂flee away＂．The devil and his cohorts run for the nearest rock．By shadows， we mean confusion，murky understanding and so forth．I＇ve known those breakthroughs， that moment when the light switches on and faith becomes sight．

But it takes time．Time takes time．Grief therapy is not brief therapy．You will cry again，but the salt in tears is antiseptic．They cleanse the emotions as well the tear ducts． And anger may surface at times．It is not fair that your husband didn＇t get to say goodbye before it all ended in that Iraqi desert ambush．What kind of God would allow your fiancé to be crippled in a car wreck，never again to speak？Grief therapy must become belief therapy．Anger yields to acceptance，as somehow，we choose to believe that God is good
